LIFT EV'RY VOICE AND SING

Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing – often called "The Black National Anthem" – was written as a poem by James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938) and then set to music by his brother John Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954) in 1899. It was first performed in public in the Johnsons' hometown of Jacksonville, Florida as part of a celebration of Lincoln's Birthday on February 12, 1900 by a choir of 500 schoolchildren at the segregated Stanton School, where James Weldon Johnson was principal.

Lift ev'ry voice and sing,

'Til earth and heaven ring,
Ring with the harmonies of Liberty;
Let our rejoicing rise
High as the list'ning skies,
Let it resound loud as the rolling sea.
Sing a song full of the faith that the dark past has taught us,
Sing a song full of the hope that the present has brought us;
Facing the rising sun of our new day begun,
Let us march on 'til victory is won.

Stony the road we trod,
Bitter the chastening rod,
Felt in the days when hope unborn had died;
Yet with a steady beat,
Have not our weary feet
Come to the place for which our fathers sighed?
We have come over a way that with tears has been watered,
We have come, treading our path through the blood of the slaughtered,
Out from the gloomy past,
'Til now we stand at last
Where the white gleam of our bright star is cast.

God of our weary years,
God of our silent tears,
Thou who has brought us thus far on the way;
Thou who has by Thy might
Led us into the light,
Keep us forever in the path, we pray.
Lest our feet stray from the places, our God, where we met Thee,
Lest, our hearts drunk with the wine of the world, we forget Thee;
Shadowed beneath Thy hand,
May we forever stand,
True to our God,
True to our native land.

THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER

In 1814, Francis Scott Key wrote the poem, *Defense of Fort McHenry*. The poem was later put to the tune of (John Stafford Smith's song) *The Anacreontic Song*, modified somewhat, and retitled *The Star Spangled Banner*. Congress proclaimed

THE STAR SPANGLED BANNER THE U.S. NATIONAL ANTHEM IN 1931.

Oh, say, can you see, by the dawn's early light,
What so proudly we hail'd at the twilight's last gleaming?
Whose broad stripes and bright stars, thro' the perilous fight,
O'er the ramparts we watch'd, were so gallantly streaming?
And the rockets' red glare, the bombs bursting in air,
Gave proof thro' the night that our flag was still there.
O say, does that star-spangled banner yet wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave?

On the shore dimly seen thro' the mists of the deep, Where the foe's haughty host in dread silence reposes, What is that which the breeze, o'er the towering steep, As it fitfully blows, half conceals, half discloses? Now it catches the gleam of the morning's first beam, In full glory reflected, now shines on the stream: 'Tis the star-spangled banner: O, long may it wave O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!

And where is that band who so vauntingly swore
That the havoc of war and the battle's confusion
A home and a country should leave us no more?
Their blood has wash'd out their foul footsteps' pollution.
No refuge could save the hireling and slave
From the terror of flight or the gloom of the grave:
And the star-spangled banner in triumph doth wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave.

O, thus be it ever when freemen shall stand,
Between their lov'd homes and the war's desolation;
Blest with vict'ry and peace, may the heav'n-rescued land
Praise the Pow'r that hath made and preserv'd us a nation!
Then conquer we must, when our cause is just,
And this be our motto: "In God is our trust"
And the star-spangled banner in triumph shall wave
O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave!



NAACP FOUNDED FEBRUARY 12, 1909



FOUNDERS

Mary White Ovington, John Haynes Holmes, Moorfield Storey, Ida B. Wells-Barnett, Henry Moskowitz, Oswald Garrison Villard, William English Walling and W.E.B. Du Bois led "The Call" to renew the struggle for civil and political liberty.

THE OLDEST AND BOLDEST CIVIL RIGHTS ORGANIZATION

Founded February 12, 1909, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People "NAACP" is the nation's oldest, largest and most widely recognized, grassroots-based civil rights organization. Its more than half-million members and supporters throughout the United States and the world are the premier advocates for civil rights in their communities, campaigning for equal opportunity and conducting voter mobilization.

The mission of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) is to ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights of all persons and to eliminate race-based discrimination.

The vision of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is to ensure a society in which all individuals have equal rights without discrimination based on race.

FOUNDING GROUP

The NAACP was formed partly in response to the continuing horrific <u>practice of lynching</u> and the 1908 race riot in Springfield, the capital of Illinois and resting place of President Abraham Lincoln. Appalled at the violence that was committed against blacks, a group of white liberals that included Mary White Ovington and Oswald Garrison Villard, both the descendants of abolitionists, William English Walling and Dr. Henry Moscowitz issued a call for a meeting to discuss racial justice. Some 60 people, seven of whom were African American (including W.E.B. Du Bois, Ida B. Wells-Barnett and Mary Church Terrell), signed the call, which was released on the centennial of Lincoln's birth.

Other early members included Joel and Arthur Spingarn, Josephine Ruffin, Mary Talbert, Inez Milholland, Jane Addams, Florence Kelley, Sophonisba Breckinridge, John Haynes Holmes, Mary McLeod Bethune, George Henry White, Charles Edward Russell, John Dewey, William Dean Howells, Lillian Wald, Charles Darrow, Lincoln Steffens, Ray Stannard Baker, Fanny Garrison Villard, and Walter Sachs.

THE NAACP SEEKS TO REMOVE BARRIERS OF RACIAL DISCRIMINATION.

Echoing the focus of Du Bois' Niagara Movement began in 1905, the NAACP's stated goal was to secure for all people the rights guaranteed in the 13th, 14th, and 15th Amendments to the United States Constitution, which promised an end to slavery, the equal protection of the law and universal adult male suffrage, respectively.

The NAACP's principal objective is to ensure the political, educational, social and economic equality of minority group citizens of United States and eliminate race prejudice. The NAACP seeks to remove all barriers of racial discrimination through the democratic processes.

The NAACP established its national office in New York City in 1910 and named a board of directors as well as a president, Moorfield Storey, a white constitutional lawyer and former president of the American Bar Association. The only African American among the organization's executives, Du Bois was made director of publications and research and in 1910 established the official journal of the NAACP, The Crisis.

THE OLDEST AND BOLDEST CIVIL RIGHTS ORGANIZATION

Yet the real story of the nation's most significant civil rights organization lies in the hearts and minds of the people who would not stand idly by while the rights of America's darker citizens were denied. From bold investigations of mob brutality, protests of mass murders, segregation and discrimination, to testimony before congressional committees on the vicious tactics used to bar African Americans from the ballot box, it was the talent and tenacity of NAACP members that saved lives and changed many negative aspects of American society.

While much of NAACP history is chronicled in books, articles, pamphlets and magazines, the true movement lies in the faces—the diverse multiracial army of ordinary women and men from every walk of life, race and class—united to awaken the consciousness of a people and a nation. The NAACP will remain vigilant in its mission until the promise of America is made real for all Americans.

OBJECTIVES

The following statement of objectives is found on the first page of the NAACP Constitution – the principal objectives of the Association shall be:

- To ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of all citizens
- To achieve equality of rights and eliminate race prejudice among the citizens of the United States
- To remove all barriers of racial discrimination through democratic processes
- To seek enactment and enforcement of federal, state, and local laws securing civil rights
- To inform the public of the adverse effects of racial discrimination and to seek its elimination

To educate persons as to their constitutional rights and to take all lawful action to secure the exercise thereof, and to take any other lawful action in furtherance of these objectives, consistent with the NAACP's Articles of Incorporation and this Constitution.

KEYNOTE SPEAKER



Throughout his career, Greg Stanton has worked tirelessly to deliver results for Arizona families. Serving as Phoenix mayor from 2012 to 2018, he focused on building an economy rooted in innovation and trade. Under his leadership, Phoenix created thousands of quality jobs and recently saw the highest wage growth in the nation.

Greg has earned a reputation for working across the aisle to get things done. His biggest accomplishments in Phoenix were passed with bipartisan support: the City's investment in the biosciences and higher education, support for small businesses, and national recognition for leadership on LGBT equality. In 2015, Stanton won reelection and successfully led one of the most ambitious transportation initiatives in the country—a

bipartisan, voter-backed plan to extend Phoenix's light rail system, expand bus service, and improve thousands of miles of roadways over the next 35 years.

During his time in Congress, Stanton has focused on planning for the state's water future, investing in public transportation and infrastructure, building Arizona's economy of the future and lowering costs for working families.

Stanton is a member of the Transportation & Infrastructure Committee and the Foreign Affairs Committee.

Before his election as mayor, Greg served nine years on the Phoenix City Council and as Arizona's Deputy Attorney General. He attended Marquette University on the Harry S. Truman Scholarship, and earned a law degree from the University of Michigan.

The Honorable Steven Horsford

Rep. Horsford understands the challenges many families in Nevada's Fourth face each and everyday. He fights for responsible gun control and background checks. He lost his father when he was 19 and empathizes with those who have experienced the pain of losing a loved one to gun violence. His work has focused on ending the school to prison pipeline and provide the safety net children and families need to succeed. He has worked to strengthen children, families and communities because these are priorities for so many Nevadans.

For more than a decade, Rep. Horsford led the Culinary Training Academy, the largest job training program in Nevada, helping thousands of workers find quality careers in the hospitality industry. An unique partnership between labor and business, the Culinary Training Academy under Rep. Rep. Horsford made history as Nevada's first African-American State Senate Majority Leader and he delivered. He passed the "Clean Energy Jobs Initiative" and positioned Nevada as a leader in renewable energy. When Nevada's economy was devastated during the recession, Rep. Horsford worked across party lines to solve the worst budget crisis in state history.

While previously representing Nevadans in our nation's capital, Rep. Horsford worked to ensure veterans, seniors citizens, and all Nevadans received the benefits they deserved, authored and passed the Nevada Lands Bill to create jobs across the state, and fought to protect a woman's right to make her own healthcare decisions.

Most recently a small business owner, in partnership with Intel, Horsford worked to bring the firstof its kind workforce development program for youth and young adults to North Las Vegas. He helped to launch a food recovery program with Three Square and major employers like MGM Resorts to address food insecurity among needy children, families and seniors. He brings a principled focus on job creation, community development and skills development to Congress. Born and raised in Las Vegas to an immigrant mother, Rep. Horsford has worked hard to raise and nurture his three children.

Christopher Owens was born in Saginaw, MI, award-winning writer/spoken word artist Truth B. Told (born Christopher Owens) has wowed audiences from Ford Theater in Hollywood to the Alvin Ailey Theater in Manhattan & Barclays Center in Brooklyn. The multiple slam champion has been featured on BET's Black History Moment series and Dove/Twitter's #SpeakBeautiful campaign, has appeared on MTV, VHI, and PBS, and even wrote a successful pitch for a company on ABC's Shark Tank.

Owens is also founder and CEO of Culture PHX, a communityfocused company founded in September 2017 that specializes in curating events and initiatives to empower Black and other underserved communities that has garnered national

headlines for its work with the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury and New York Liberty. Culture PHX's next endeavor, CultureHUB—Arizona's first Black-owned co-working and event space—is scheduled to open 2023 in the historic Eastlake neighborhood, providing a culturally safe space for Black entrepreneurs with creative and corporate backgrounds and endeavors. Culture PHX's motto is "Built different to make a difference."

Corey Woods was elected mayor of the City of Tempe in March 2020. In his professional career, he is Executive Director of Community Relations at ASU Preparatory Academy. Woods is responsible for assisting the managing director with operations, external partnerships and strategic initiatives. He previously served as the chief operating officer for the Greater Phoenix Urban League, director of college and career articulation for the Phoenix Union High School District and director of government relations for the American Lung Association of Arizona.

Woods served as a Councilmember for the City of Tempe from July 2008 – July 2016. He was elected to the Tempe City Council in May 2008 and reelected in March 2012. Woods was instrumental in guiding city policy that led to Tempe's perfect score in the Human Rights Campaign's "Municipal Equality Index." He championed initiatives in the areas of affordable housing and human services while working tirelessly to improve community development standards to attract business investment and protect neighborhoods.

Woods was named 2022 "Advocate of the Year" by the Arizona Housing Coalition for his advocacy work expanding affordable and workforce housing opportunities. He currently serves as Vice Chair of the United States Conference of Mayors' Housing and Community Development Committee and as Co-Chair of the National League of Cities' Housing Supply Accelerator Steering Committee.

Woods graduated from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor in April 2000 with a B.A. in Political Science, and a minor in African-American Studies. After college, Woods was a teaching assistant at ASU for three years. In May 2018, Woods earned a Master of Arts in Educational Policy from ASU's Mary Lou Fulton College of Education.

LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS OF ARIZONA



Pinny Sheoran, President

Pinny's commitment to the League has, quite literally, spanned generations of her life. She immigrated from India to the US in 1974 to pursue her graduate education at the University of Cincinnati. As a graduate student there, her dedication to the ideals of democracy was recognized by her Faculty mentor and she was urged to join the League as a student member. During that 2 year period her volunteer work included registering voters and helping at League events. Thus was her initiation into understanding the importance of voting rights in this country, and the League's role in that struggle/movement. As a foreign student, her experience in the League was critical for the development of her understanding of American Democracy, the

Suffragette movement and the nexus of the Civil Rights and Voting Rights movement. In 2016, she decided she could no longer sit on the sidelines and became a very active League member. Pinny has been a member of the League since 2016.

In 2019 Pinny was appointed as a director to the LWV Arizona State Board, representing LWV of Metro Phoenix. Pinny has served as the State Advocacy chair since 2019. She was elected to the LWV Metro Phoenix local league board as President Elect in 2020 and currently serves as the President. She was also elected to the office of LWVAZ State Board President in 2021, and will serve as the incoming president in 2022. Her passion is protecting the freedom to vote. She serves as the designated volunteer lobbyists for the LWV of Arizona, and as the State Advocacy Chair provides leadership for the League in Legislative advocacy and lobbying. In November of 2020, Pinny provided leadership on behalf of the League to build support and public awareness for "Peace at the Polls". This initiative was to increase the involvement of league and other coalition partners in serving as poll workers, election protection monitors and observers. She is also providing leadership for the Arizona Leagues on expanding Arizona presence on the LWV Vote411 platform. She serves as the League representative on the Election Protection Arizona (EPAZ)coalition led by the Lawyers committee and the Leadership Conference local chapter All Voting is Local.

Pinny has Masters and Doctorate in Applied statistics from the University of Cincinnati and undergraduate degree in Sociology and English from the University of Bangalore, India. She retired as a faculty of the Maricopa Community College District in 2006, after 25 years of service.

Her time in retirement has been devoted to democracy issues. She was a member of the Mesa Sunrise Rotary and has served as the president(twice) of the chapter, also elected to the India Association of Phoenix Board Member from 2007-2010 in the role of secretary and treasurer.

Pinny and her husband Yogi have lived in Scottsdale since 1980 where she and her husband raised a son and daughter and several lovable labrador retrievers.

EDUCATION AWARD



Dr. Albert Celoza succeeds Rev. Larry Fultz. Dr. Paul Eppinger, whose name has been associated with interfaith and Ecumenism in Arizona, is the founding director of the organization. Dr. Celoza has served as faculty in World Religions and Political Science since the 1980's at Phoenix College, Thunderbird School of Global Management and Arizona State University.

He is a faculty fellow of the Brandeis University ENACT – The Educational Network for Active Civic Transformation, The International Center for Ethics, Justice and Public Life. He gave classes and chaired the Season for Nonviolence at the Franciscan Renewal Center, or the Casa (Paz y Bien). He has been recognized for excellence in teaching and was awarded the Arizona Professor of the Year in 2001 by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. He holds degrees in the humanities, religious studies, political science, and public administration.

Recently, Dr. Celoza completed Applied Compassion Training (ACT). "The implementation of the Capstone Project for CCARE Stanford enriched and enlivened my vocation as a teacher. ACT gave me the opportunity to do research, formulate and design teaching and learning strategies. Compassion as a subject of inquiry and study presented me with curricular opportunities for enriching my mission of education," said Dr. Celoza. (CCARE is the Center for Compassion and Altruism Research and Education at Stanford University Medicine.)

Dr. Celoza's travels have taken him to France to study with the Buddhist teacher Thich Nhat Hanh at Plum Village, to the Middle East to study Biblical Archaeology, to Morocco to learn about Islam, and to various pilgrimage, religious sites and shrines. Additionally, Dr. Celoza has been a long time member of AZIFM. He has partnered in significant ways to further the mission of AZIFM in 2009 when he was on a sabbatical, which included participation in AZIFM's workshop at the Parliament of the World's Religions in Melbourne, Australia.

For more than 15 years he led Phoenix College Liberal Arts and established programs related to citizenship and civic engagement, and international studies. In addition to mentoring students, he funded scholarship endowments to support students in the sciences and international studies. Dr. Celoza served as president of the United Nations (UNA-USA) Phoenix & Arizona and is currently Board President of the Asian Pacific Community in Action. Among his published works is the book *Ferdinand Marcos and the Philippines: The Political Economy of Authoritarianism* (Praeger, 1997).

Albert is married to Ann McLean Celoza. Their daughters are Amelia, assistant professor of engineering at the University of Colorado Boulder and Emma, academic advisor at the W.P. Carey College of Business, Arizona State University and instructor at the Sun Devil Fitness Center.
